City of Suwanee Receives Top Marks from National Citizen Survey

In 2017, the City of Suwanee voluntarily participated in its fifth National Citizen Survey, a statistically valid survey managed by the National Research Center that gathers resident opinions across a range of issues. As in previous years, residents' ratings put the city at or near the top in a variety of areas as compared to other communities across the country.

"We always learn something about ourselves as a community through the National Citizen Survey, and it's gratifying that this year's results indicate that the City of Suwanee continues to be headed in the right direction," commented Mayor Jimmy Burnette.

The overall quality of life in Suwanee was rated as excellent or good by 92 percent of residents, and 95 percent rated the city as an excellent or good place to live and raise children. More than nine out of ten

respondents rated the City's overall image and appearance positively with almost all reporting that they would recommend Suwanee as a place to live (97 percent).

In April the 2017 survey was sent to 1,500 randomly selected city addresses. The National Citizen Survey is endorsed by the International City/County Management Association and the National League of Cities.

"The depth and breadth of information that we obtain through the National Citizen Survey is extraordinary," said City Manager Marty Allen. "There's an old saying that if you don't keep score, you'll never know if you're winning or losing. We appreciate that our citizens took the time to report on their experiences with the City of Suwanee and that as a city and a community, it appears, we continue to do an outstanding job."

The full scorecard report – a summary of 42 characteristic and service areas (out of 125) which compares the National Research Center's database of resident opinions gathered from approximately 600 jurisdictions in the United States – can be found at Suwanee.com.

THE EIGHTH ANNUAL SUWANEE AMERICAN CRAFT BEER FEST RETURNS TO TOWN CENTER PARK ON MARCH 17 FROM 1-5 P.M.

Recognized as one of the biggest and best craft beer festivals in the Southeast, Beer Fest features unlimited samples of more than 350 craft beers — more than enough to sate the appetite of thirsty hopheads. The beer selection will have something for everyone and ranges from hard-to-find seasonals to perennial favorites, as well as local brews mingling with national breweries.

While Suwanee Beer Fest has always taken place around St. Patrick's Day, 2018 marks the first year the festival will take place on the actual holiday! In keeping with the spirit of St. Patrick's Day, the event will feature a performance by the Drake School of Irish Dance and the sweet sounds of bagpipes, as well as a home brew competition.

Tickets are available for purchase at **SuwaneeBeerFest.com**. General admission includes unlimited samples of craft beer, backyard games such as cornhole and giant Jenga, wine samples, and food for purchase from local restaurants and food trucks. The VIP Experience includes early entry to the fest (beginning at noon), rare and exclusive beers, access to a private dining and tasting area, food catered by Marlow's Tavern, and more. Meet the Architects of Some of Suwanee's Best Events!

Ever wonder how Suwanee's amazing events calendar comes together year after year? Take a little dive into the brains of our event masterminds, Events & Outreach Manager Amy Doherty and Events Coordinator Kim Towne:

HOW DID YOU SELECT THE EVENTS THAT WILL BE INCLUDED ON THE 2018 CALENDAR?

AMY: We receive and review nearly 30 applications for non-city-run events each year. We try to select the ones that add the most value to the quality of life for our Suwanee area residents, and also events that are fun and unique. Where else can you go in Suwanee to hang a hammock, read a book, exercise, watch a movie, hear a concert, buy some vegetables, and grab some grub from a food truck?

WHAT KIND OF PLANNING GOES INTO THESE EVENTS?

KIM: Most attendees don't see all of the logistics that go on behind the "event curtain" – securing portable toilets, coordinating constant trash pick-up, load-in and load-out craziness, and working with the police to make sure they're able to execute a great safety plan, among others. We also put a lot of thought into the placements of certain vendors, bathrooms, etc. We want each event to look unique and different, but also to not confuse people by moving things all over the park. Details are fully thought through, thought about again, and then thought through again.

AMY: For our private event planners (i.e., events not run by city staff), we host a training meeting so that they all get to hear our rules, guidelines, and best practices. Our goal is for attendees to not notice the difference between the private events and the city planned events. We just want everyone to come to the park and have a great time!

WHICH EVENT ARE YOU MOST EXCITED ABOUT IN 2018?

KIM: I can't wait to see Glow in the Park come to life again in 2018. Last year, we thought we had a simple idea and were blown away by the number of folks who showed up to walk in the lantern parade! I can't wait to see how creative people get with making paper lanterns!

AMY: I'm excited to see Happy Feet's Jingle in the Park get off the ground this year. Christmas is one of my favorite times of year, and visiting holiday pop-up markets with friends is a favorite activity. Suwanee is ready for its own version and this organization is a great beneficiary of the event!

Police Body Cameras Protecting Both Sides of the Badge

In February of 2017, the Suwanee Police Department began equipping its patrol officers with body-worn cameras in an effort to improve transparency and enhance the credibility of police actions.

"Body cameras have emerged as a point of agreement between reform advocates and law enforcement officials," said Suwanee Police Chief Mike Jones. "The cameras help ensure police officers are maintaining the values of our organization, while providing invaluable situational context."

Body-worn cameras protect not only the officers, but the citizens they serve, improving behavior on both sides of the badge. A 2013 study by the University of Cambridge published in the *Journal of Quantitative Criminology* revealed that both police use-of-force and citizen complaints against the police were dramatically reduced by the use of body cameras.

Results from a year-long study by the University of South Florida regarding a body-worn camera pilot program at the Orlando Police Department reports that use-of-force incidents dropped 53 percent among officers with the cameras. Civilian complaints against those officers also

saw a 65 percent decline. The study showed significant reductions in the number of civilian injuries by officers wearing body cameras, and of injuries to the officers themselves.

Body-worn cameras provide tangible benefits as well. Footage can be used as evidence and improves the accuracy of report writing, which equates to fewer cases going to trial and less time spent in court.

The body-worn cameras and dedicated server for storing video footage were paid for with capital funds. Suwanee police officers enable their body-worn cameras for any interaction with the public, excluding casual encounters.

"In an age where random cell phone videos go viral and help form public opinion, body cameras provide much-needed context for interactions," said Chief Jones. "Body-worn cameras show the officer's line-of-sight point of view – as opposed to the full reality of the situation – providing realistic information about the situation the officer was in at the time."

Let Suwanee Put Your ART on LIMB

The City of Suwanee is seeking proposals and samples from artists willing to go out on a limb for the city's finders-keepers art-in-nature program.

A beloved Suwanee tradition, Art on a Limb is an award-winning, monthlong program designed to celebrate and bring attention to the arts, as well as the natural beauty of the Suwanee parks and greenway. Since 2005, the city has hidden two pieces of original artwork daily throughout the month of May within City of Suwanee parks and along the greenway; those who find a piece of art get to keep it.

Past Art on a Limb pieces have included clay birds and orbs, small paintings on canvas, pieces of the City's old water tower, magnets, gourds painted to look like birds, the Suwanee S shaped from metal, and pottery pieces that include leaves found along the Greenway. This year, we're looking for something a bit more whimsical; think fairy doors, pot creatures, and the like.

The Orchard at White Street Park

All the hours of hard work put in by volunteers this spring, summer, and fall at the Orchard at White Street Park has paid off big time this winter – the Orchard is the recipient of not one, but TWO prestigious awards!

The Georgia Urban Forest Council recognized the Orchard at White Street Park as its 2017 Outstanding New Initiative, and Keep Georgia Beautiful chose the orchard for its 2017 Community Beautification award. The Orchard designer and super volunteers Roger and Brittany Grant were on-hand to accept the awards on behalf of the city.

"We're so grateful to live in a community that has embraced this project and helped us to fulfill this dream," said the Grants. "These awards are a reflection of the hard work from volunteers and city staff that made this park a reality."

A fully functional orchard that is open to the public, the Orchard at White Street Park is the first of its kind in the Southeast. One facet of the long-term vision for Harvest Farm and the surrounding White Street Park was to provide a public orchard to enhance the community's knowledge of gardening, local food sources, and the environment. Space for an orchard was programmed on the original 2009 master plan for White Street Park; the city completed construction on the second phase of the park (which includes the orchard) in 2017.

City of Suwanee Named a 2017 Crown Community

The City of Suwanee has been named a 2017 Crown Community by American City & County magazine for its work on the Orchard at White Street Park.

Suwanee funded the \$183,471 project using special purpose local option sales tax (SPLOST) funds. Citizen and landscape architect Roger Grant and his firm, Columbia Engineering, donated 200 hours of design and work, at an estimated value of \$22,000. Moving forward, the city will give an annual \$1,000 to the orchard's management committee, and its public works department will handle ongoing maintenance, which will involve organic pesticides.

Since 1909, American City & County has recognized local governments for extraordinary work in their communities. The magazine received applications from cities and counties across the U.S. and recognized six innovative and impactful local government projects in 2017, choosing projects with meaningful issues, clever solutions, innovative implementation, measurable results, and ultimately replicable ideas.

Suwanee Police Officer Reunited with Baby He Delivered on Interstate – 20 Years Ago



Off-duty Suwanee Police Officer Elton Hassell was lucky to be stuck in a traffic jam on I-85 in July 1997 – or rather, Yelsin Vazquez was lucky.

Hassell – then a Gwinnett County Corrections Officer – noticed a panicked man standing next to his car, screaming. Hassell exited his car to see if he could help, peered into the car, and found a woman in labor.

"I looked down and I saw part of a head and a full head of hair," said Hassell.

Hassell had never assisted in a birth before, but there's a first time for everything. He had also never saved a life before.

"The cord was wrapped around his neck and his lips and face were blue," Hassell said.

Officer Hassell unwrapped the cord, waited for paramedics to arrive, and then went on his way. Twenty years later, he received a call from Jennifer Vazquez, wife of Yelsin Vazquez, the baby whose life he has saved. The Vazquez family – including Yelsin's own daughter – made the trip to Suwanee in December to meet Officer Hassell and say thank you for being stuck in that traffic jam that fateful night.
