# COUNCIL MEETING – 6:30 PM COUNCIL CHAMBERS

#### A. Call to Order

Mayor Burnette called the meeting to order at 6:37 PM and read the procedures for Public Hearings for the record.

#### **B.** Public Hearing

#### 1. Alcohol Beverage License – Courtyard Marriott

Courtyard Marriott, located at 310 Celebration Drive, has applied for a new licensee to serve beer, wine and distilled spirits. Mr. Rajendra Patel is the licensee and was present at the meeting. The Business Services department recommends approval.

2. RZ-2017-009 – Owner: Karen Williams. Applicant: Jennifer Spencer. The applicant requests a rezoning from R-100 (Residential Single Family District) to OTCD (Old Town Commercial District) to allow for a reception hall. The site is located along White Street across from White Street Park and contains approximately 1.5 acres

Josh Campbell, Planning Division Director, presented the staff analysis. The request is to allow for the development of an approximately 6,000 sq. ft. reception hall and associated parking on the subject property. The building would be a rustic style, white farmhouse that sits approximately 30 feet tall with a large covered side porch facing a garden area. The developer of the new adjacent Harvest Park neighborhood is extending white Street to intersect with Buford Highway just past White Street Pak. This new public road will serve as the primary access for the proposed reception hall.

The property is located across the street form White Street Park which includes the harvest Farm community garden, Harvest Farm barn and the newly completed Orchard. The Downtown Suwanee Master Plan calls for White Street o preserve its semi-rural character while incorporating a mix of small lot single family housing types. The OTCD rezoning is appropriate for the subject property for the proposed use of a reception hall.

The Planning Department recommends approval with conditions. There is no recommendation from the Planning Commission.

### Support:

Mr. Kurtz provided detail related to the proposed events venue. He stated there will be minimal traffic impact to the area. There have been concerns related to alcohol at events, all caterers will be permitted. There have been concerns related to noise, there will be no outside speakers. A tree buffer is proposed. All events to be terminated no later than 11 PM.

Council asked questions related to grading and disturbance along railroad, retaining walls on the site, alcohol use, tree buffers, ingress/egress to the site, operating hours and staffing, etc.

Tonya Christiano, 1300 Peachtree Industrial Boulevard, Suwanee, GA
Ms. Christiano stated events will take place on evenings & weekends.
During the week there may be classes and/or corporate meetings, etc.
Weekday events are unlikely.

## Opposition:

- Will Mashburn, 712 White Street, Suwanee, GA, expressed concern for events serving alcohol and the impact on park usage and liability with children being in the area using Harvest Farm Park. He also expressed concerns related to increased traffic in the area.
- Kristen Nielsen, 763 Cambron Commons Trace, Suwanee, GA, expressed concerns related to traffic along White Street and asked if a traffic study

has been conducted. She also expressed concerns related to water run-off due to grading the site.

- Roger Grant, 4015 Dollar Circle, Suwanee, GA, stated he liked the architectural concept and it seemed the applicant was trying to fit in Suwanee's vision. The site plan did not look realistic. He stated the site grade change seemed to be 38-41 feet. There seemed to be a reasonable about of cut & fill work to be done and it will be expensive to haul off the dirt from site.
- Jill Mashburn, 712 White Street, Suwanee, GA, expressed concern that the facility would be so close to the church.
- Angela Isom, 673 White Street, Suwanee, GA, stated she is the oldest property owner on White Street. She is concerned with traffic.

#### Applicant Rebuttal

• Jason Spencer, 3749 Baxley Ridge Drive, Suwanee, GA, stated this is not a rural area and is designated mixed-use.
