

The annual Suwanee Fest Parade will roll through the streets of downtown this year on Saturday, September 15! The traditional kick-off to the two-day celebration of community, the parade begins at 9 am on Main Street, then travels along Suwanee Dam to Buford Highway, passing in front of the judges' station at Town Center Park.

This year's parade grand marshal is WSB Channel 2 Action News meteorologist Karen Minton. Minton's television career began in 1981 at KOVR in Sacramento, moving to Atlanta in 1984 to work for the Weather Channel as an on-camera meteorologist.

Minton joined WSB-TV in 1986 as a weekend weather anchor for the noon, 6:00 pm, and 11:00 pm newscasts and the weekday early morning and noon newscasts. In 1993, her duties were expanded to include coanchoring Channel 2 Action News This Morning. She had the dual role of anchoring the news and forecasting and presenting the weather on Action News This Morning from 5 to 7 am for seven years.

During Minton's tenure at WSB, she has had the privilege to guest host People to People and interview celebrities in the Salute to America 4th of July and Children's Health Care of Atlanta parades. Her work was honored in 1988 with the Associated Press Award for Excellence in Weather Reporting and in 2008 received an Emmy for Outstanding Achievement in Team Coverage.

Raised in Lodi, California, Minton graduated from the University of the Pacific in Stockton with a bachelor's degree in biological sciences, and completed the broadcast meteorology program at Mississippi State University. A member of the American Meteorological Society, Minton holds the AMS Broadcast Seal of Approval.

unicycles, strollers, wheelchairs, golf carts, etc. - in red, white, and blue Americana finery and be a part of this patriotic celebration!

10:15-10:35 am | Royal Dance Academy

This talented group of dancers is a crowd favorite! This year they will perform an Americana-inspired dance medley as a tribute to the bicentennial celebration of Gwinnett County.

11:00-11:10 am | Gwinnett Majorette Twirl Club

Gwinnett Majorette Twirl Club is a Christian outreach, baton twirling and parade marching program. 2018 marks GMT's second performance in the Suwanee Fest Parade and first appearance on stage. The goal of the GMT program is to encourage girls to seek out challenges, become dedicated to a sport, and develop an understanding of their enormous opportunities and possibilities.

11:30-11:45 am | Shae' Elites Nance Line

Shae' Elites is a parade and performance dance line comprised of 7th-8th graders that are selected through auditions. The goal of Shae' Elites is to learn showmanship, healthy lifestyle choices, and leadership skills, as well as various styles of dance and choreography.

12:00-12:10 pm | Dancing Belles

Five women from diverse backgrounds united by their common passion for dance, Dancing Belles are trained in the Indian classical dance form Bharatanatyam. They will be performing classical Indian dance to

a medley of western music, demonstrating that dance and music transcends countries, languages, and cultures.

12:30-12:45 pm | Annandale Village Singers

Annandale Village provides progressive life assistance to adults with developmental disabilities and acquired brain injuries so that they can maximize their abilities and maintain their independence in the least restrictive environment. Comprised of 30 Villagers, the Annandale Choir has performed all over metro Atlanta since 2014 and are making their Suwanee Fest debut!

1:15-1:35 pm | Stone Mountain Chorus

Established in 1981, the Stone Mountain Chorus is devoted to music education and enjoyment, while promoting the barbershop style of a cappella singing. In addition to entertaining at festivals, the chorus performs the American and Canadian national anthems (most notably at Atlanta Gladiator hockey games) and competes in the Dixie District of the Barbershop Harmony Society.

2:15-3:00 pm | Engine 209

Engine 209 takes its namesake from the famous locomotive located in Gainesville, Georgia, which is also where the band calls home. Forged from a genuine love of classic rock and roll, Engine 209 presents itself as "your friendly neighborhood band," striving to recreate each song true to its original form while also adding their own unique flavor.

3:30-4:30 pm | Few Miles South

Few Miles South offers a refreshing take on country music: a "touch of the Bakersfield sound," blues and southern rock with influences ranging from Hank Williams to the Allman Brothers. South Georgian Blake English and L.A. native Tori Lund met after playing together in church, began writing and recording together with the intent to shop songs to other artists – and the rest is history.

CITY OF SUWANEE WINS DOWNTOWN EXCELLENCE AWARDS

The City of Suwanee won Downtown Excellence Awards in the Volunteer and Organization categories at the 2018 Georgia Downtown Association Conference at Chateau Elan on August 15, 2018.

The Beavins and Sullivans have led a 20-member Suwanee Fest volunteer committee for the past ten and five years, respectively. The committee meets January through October and includes sub-committees who oversee entertainment, transportation, children's activities, vendor selection, logistics, and festival volunteers. By September, these volunteers have already given the City of Suwanee countless hours of dedicated and focused volunteer service, including close to 40 hours on the actual weekend of Suwanee Fest.

"I honestly don't know of a more deserving set of people to receive an award for volunteerism," said Suwanee Events & Outreach Manager Amy Doherty. "Janis, Paul, Robin, and David are the embodiment of exceptional volunteer service. We put a ton of city time, resources, energy, and effort into Suwanee Fest, but it wouldn't be possible without these four super hero volunteers."

The Suwanee Welcome Center partnership was selected as the **Organization category winner**.

In a joint venture, the City of Suwanee and North Gwinnett Arts Association (NGAA) entered into a partnership in 2016 that allows the NGAA to have much-needed gallery and class space in Suwanee Town Center, while also creating and staffing a welcome center for the city. This strategic partnership allows visitors and locals alike to be welcomed to Suwanee with a high-energy, beautiful, art-filled space in Suwanee Town Center.

"The joint welcome and arts center allows the city to have a presence that extends beyond the normal business hours," said Marty Allen, Suwanee City Manager. "City Hall is closed on weekends, which is when a large percentage of visitors are in Town Center. A welcome center affords us the opportunity to serve as ambassadors to visitors and leveraging a collaboration with the NGAA provides a welcoming presence."

Located at 3930 Charleston Market Street in Suwanee Town Center, the city's annual contract with NGAA to host the welcome center in the art gallery is funded out of the hotel/motel tax fund, which is intended to go towards such programs. The 2,297 square-foot facility features art classes, workshops, and a gallery.

The Downtown Excellence Awards recognizes and promotes the outstanding achievements of Georgia's local downtown development and revitalizing organizations in Georgia's communities. The Beavins, Sullivans, and NGAA representatives were honored at a reception and ceremony at Chateau Elan in Braselton, GA during the 2018 Georgia Downtown Association.

BERLIN WALL PUBLIC ART PIECE **RETURNS TO TOWN CENTER**

An authenticated piece of the Berlin Wall that once separated West Berlin and East Germany has returned to Suwanee Town Center for good.

The 12-foot-tall, 7,000 pound section of the wall was donated to the city by Friends Suwanee Grill proprietors Ray Stanjevich and Suzanne Cartwright, who purchased the piece in 2013 at an auction on the Town Center Stage.

"I was born in a communist country, and Suzanne's mother immigrated from Germany after World War II," said Stanjevich, a Serbian immigrant. "We think it's important to remember the past and not forget that many still live without the basic freedoms that we enjoy in the United States."

Stanjevich displayed the piece outside of his Suwanee restaurant, and recently decided to donate it to the city as a public art piece. The Suwanee City Council voted at their June meeting to accept the relic, and it is now on display in Town Center Park.

Originally discovered in an East Berlin work camp, the once-western-facing now section features graffiti depicting an American flag, a silhouetted figure, and three buildings. The side that once faced East Berlin is mostly devoid of graffiti. The wall piece has a certificate of authenticity after tests on the concrete and rebar confirmed its materials consistent with those used in Germany in the early 1960s.

The wall section spent several months on display in front of Suwanee City Hall and the Gwinnett Justice and Administration Center in 2013 while awaiting auction after it was seized by federal officials to provide some restitution for victims of a Ponzi scheme.

"We're thrilled to be able to exhibit this section of the Berlin Wall," says Suwanee's Assistant City Manager Denise Brinson. "It's a cool way to bring an important piece of art and history to area residents. This display fits in well with Suwanee's goal of making art accessible."





POLICE CHIEF MIKE JONES NAMED OUTSTANDING CHIEF OF THE YEAR

City of Suwanee Police Chief Mike Jones was named Outstanding Chief of the Year by the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police (GACP) at the GACP Summer Training Conference in Savannah on July 24. The GACP is the largest professional association for law enforcement administrators in Georgia, and one of the largest in the country.

Chief Jones began his career in law enforcement as a dispatcher with the City of Rome Police Department in 1974, working his way through the ranks all the way to Major (Bureau Commander). He accepted the position of Chief of Police with the City of Suwanee and was sworn in on January 1, 1999, after 24 years of service in Rome.

During his tenure as Chief of Police, the Suwanee Police Department has more than doubled in size. The department became CALEA accredited in 2010 - one of just 56 in Georgia - and was reaccredited in 2013 and in 2016 with Excellence. The agency received state certification in 1999 and state recertification in 2004, 2009, 2013, and 2016. In 2016 the department was awarded the Phyllis Goodwin Agency of the Year by the Georgia Chapter of the FBI National Academy Associates.

A leader throughout the state, Chief Jones was elected to serve as vice president of the GACP in 2005 and served as president of the association from 2008-2009. Chief Jones continues to serve on multiple GACP committees and sits on the

Reinhardt College Police Academy Board, Gwinnett Technical College Advisory Board, and holds a position on the 911 Committee. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy #155 and a graduate of the Georgia Command College #14. Chief Jones has been teaching all levels of law enforcement since the 1980s, sharing his extensive experience and knowledge with his fellow officers.

Chief Jones is a strong proponent of the community policing philosophy and emphasizes the importance of positive relationships with the community he proudly serves. He established a P.A.C.T. (Police And Citizens Together) program in 2001 as a tool used to build trust within the community and to enhance its community watch program. Due to the success of the P.A.C.T. program, it has been implemented by other agencies in metro Atlanta and around the world, garnishing multiple national and international awards.

In addition to the successful residential P.A.C.T. program, the department hosts a Citizens Police Academy twice a year, has an active Explorers program, utilizes citizen volunteers in the Park Ambassador program, and staffs C.O.P.S. (Caring Officers Providing Support) in the local elementary schools. Most recently, Chief Jones has begun working closely with the Korean-American Council, a group of Korean-American business owners and stakeholders to build bridges between the Korean community and the police.



CITY OF SUWANEE RECOGNIZED FOR SUPERIOR MANAGEMENT AND LEADERSHIP

The City of Suwanee has once again been recognized by the International City/County Management Association (ICMA) for superior data-driven management and reporting efforts with a Certificate of Distinction. Suwanee is among 13 jurisdictions receiving the Certificate of Distinction, and one of 57 recognized overall. Certificates of Distinction are awarded to those who also provide comparative and benchmarking information to the public, use performance data in strategic planning and operational decision-making, and share their knowledge with other local governments through presentations, site visits, and other networking activities.

According to ICMA, the certificate program assesses a local government's performance management program and encourages analysis of results by comparing to peers and gauging performance over time. Performance management aids in cost reduction, program prioritization, and quality improvement while encouraging accountability and transparency.
