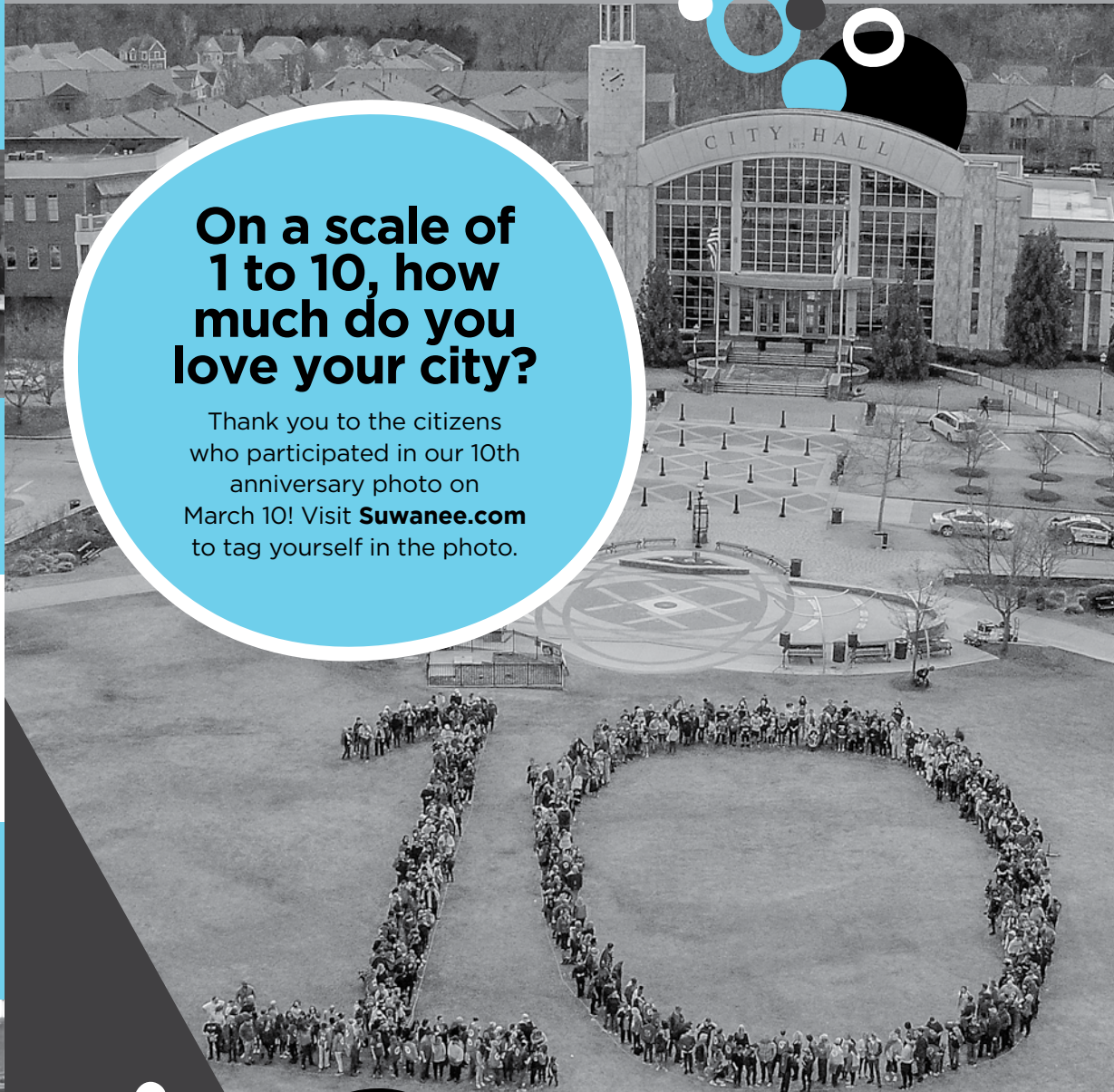

Top festivals and events throughout the southeast were recognized for their outstanding contribution to the events industry, including multiple Suwanee events.

COURT IS NOW IN SESSION AT CITY HALL

The City of Suwanee Municipal Court will temporarily move across Town Center Park to City Hall beginning May 1 in order to make room for renovations – as well as a two-story addition – to its existing building at 323 Buford Highway.

The almost 60-year-old building (Suwanee's original city hall) will be receiving a much-needed facelift that is expected to significantly improve the customer experience and create more space for court and police employees. The lobby will be expanded to accommodate court session crowds, court clerk work space will more than double, and new space will be constructed for the police

Special Enforcement Unit. The addition will also include a basement, which will provide convenient storage for Public Works and events.

Construction is anticipated to begin in late spring. A clerk will be stationed at City Hall to handle payments and routine questions. Court sessions will take place at City Hall as well; the day-to-day court functions will begin at the police station on May 6. Renovations are expected to be completed in early 2020. 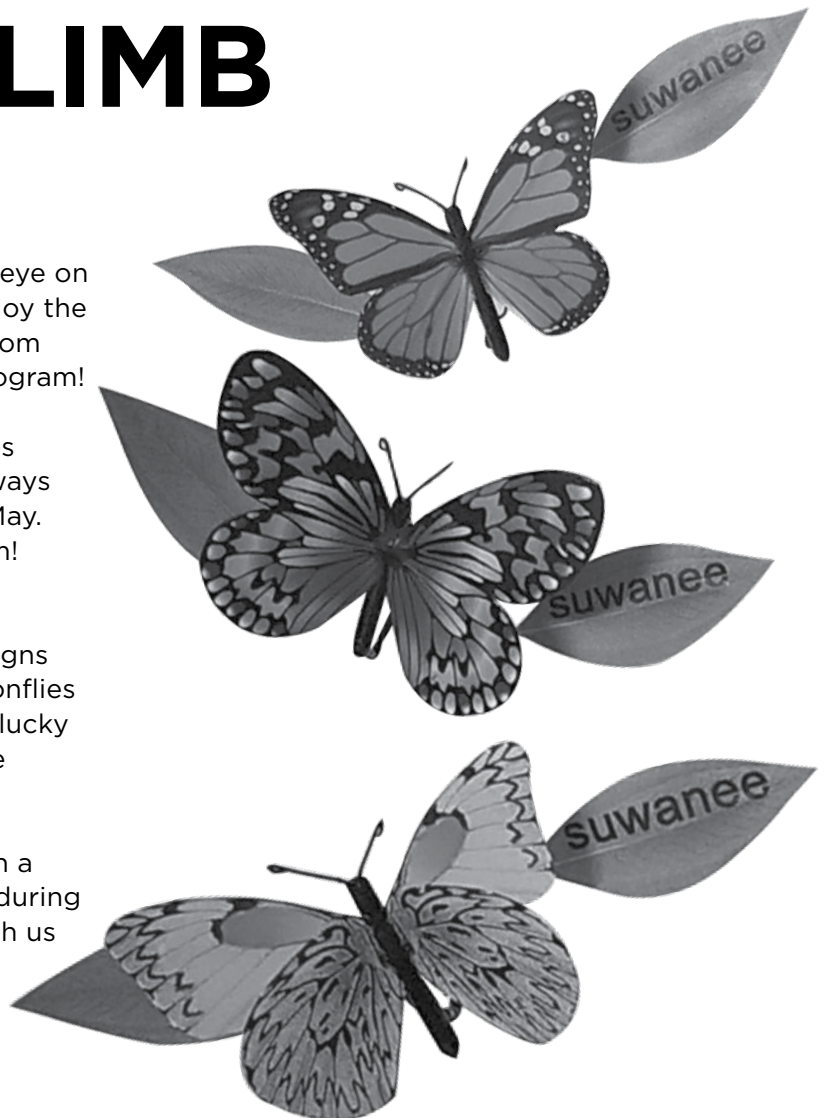
ART ON A LIMB IS BACK!

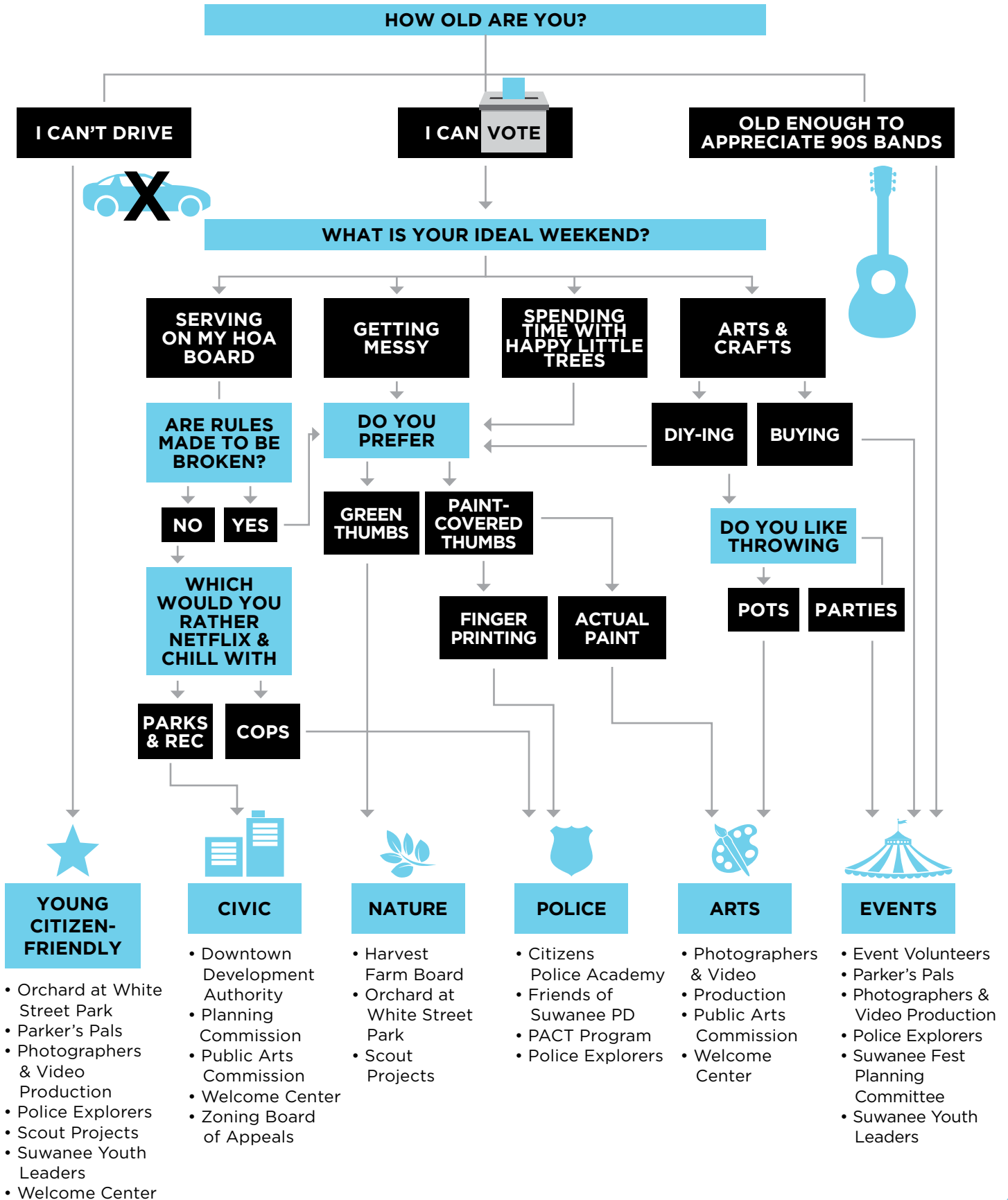

Tuesdays aren't just for tacos in Suwanee (but hey, we've got those too!). Come out and join the hundreds of people who know that Tuesday is the night to be in Town Center Park:

Peach State Cornhole began modestly in 2013 with eight teams playing out of Town Center Park. It is expected that this spring, Peach State Cornhole will host 13 different leagues with some 600 people competing, but the largest remains in Town Center.

"It's something for people of all ages — we've got 10-year-old kids all the way up to grandmas in their 70s. Anyone can throw a bag 27 feet," founder Nick Boyers said. "It makes for a really fun atmosphere. Our motto is to try to connect as many people as we can through friendly competition."

Looking for something a bit more active? Big Peach Running Co. hosts **group runs** on Tuesdays at 6:30 pm, beginning at the Town Center stage. The group offers various distances and welcomes runners and walkers of all paces and abilities.

"There are days when training for a race feels like work. Going to the Big Peach group runs makes it social again," said Teresa Fudge. "I love seeing kids running with their parents, hearing about races from the weekend, and just running with folks I don't get to see otherwise. I structure my week around the group runs!"

DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY ANNOUNCES **BREWERY & TAPROOM** AT SUWANEE TOWN CENTER

The Suwanee Downtown Development Authority is proud to announce a new partnership that will bring the Town Center its first brewery and taproom. StillFire Brewing, a 20-barrel brewery and taproom, is set to begin construction this May across from Town Center Park.

The co-founders - which include the team behind Suwanee Magazine, Suwanee Beer Fest, Gwinnett Beer Fest, and Suwanee Wine Fest - plan to convert the soon-to-be-vacated Gwinnett County Fire Station 13 into an industrial-style taproom that will feature an always-changing selection of 18 original craft beers on tap.

“Every year at the beer fest, people tell me that it is their favorite day of the year, and it became obvious to us that the community with the largest craft beer fest in Georgia needed a year-round craft brewing experience,” said co-founder Randall Veugeler.

An outdoor patio and an adjoining city-owned green space will allow customers to bring their children and dogs, to play cornhole and other games, and enjoy live music, and savor snacks from on-site food trucks. StillFire will also offer brewery tours and event space.

“StillFire will be owned and operated by people who genuinely love the Suwanee area. We live here. Our friends live here. Our kids go to school here,” said Veugeler. “We want to build a place Suwanee can be proud of. This is our thank you to the community we love and are proud to call home.”

The lease agreement for Fire Station 13 between Gwinnett County and the Suwanee Downtown Development Authority is set to expire in mid-April 2019. Gwinnett County plans to relocate the fire station to recently acquired property on Buford Highway near Westbrook Road. Station 13 personnel will continue serving the Suwanee area out of nearby stations until the new facility is completed.

“The Stillfire Brewing team is making a significant investment in our community to provide for a high-quality patron experience built around an appreciation for homegrown craft brews,” commented City of Suwanee Downtown & Business Development Manager Adam Edge. “The brewery will build upon the energy and vibrancy that exists in our downtown. It’s been great working with a team of local folks who know and understand our community and vision.”

HOSTING MORE THAN
MEETS THE EYE

Tucked away on a side street in Suwanee's Town Center is an unassuming space with a cheerful blue awning and a turquoise café table and chairs, harkening the bright, colorful interior that awaits.

The City of Suwanee and North Gwinnett Arts Association (NGAA) partnered in 2017 to create a joint welcome and arts center, allowing the NGAA to have much-needed studio and class space in Suwanee Town Center, while also providing the city with a staffed welcome center. Visitors and locals are welcomed to Suwanee with a high-energy, beautiful, art-filled space.

"The joint welcome and arts center allows the city to have a presence that extends beyond normal business hours," said Marty Allen, Suwanee City Manager. "City Hall is closed on weekends and after 5 pm, which is when a large percentage of our visitors are in Town Center. Collaboration with the NGAA allows us to have a welcoming presence when Town Center is at its busiest."

Located at 3930 Charleston Market Street, half of the 2,300 square-foot facility is dedicated to welcoming visitors with information, Suwanee swag, and an art gallery, while the other half hosts art classes, camps, and workshops for the community.

The NGAA is a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting the appreciation of local art through exhibition, festivals and other media. Based in Suwanee, the association maintains an open membership policy where artists of all types are welcome to be a part of the organization.

The city's annual contract with NGAA to host the welcome center in the art gallery is funded out of the hotel/motel tax fund, which is intended to go towards such programs. The unique partnership won a 2018 Georgia Downtown Development Award.

"What better way for Suwanee to say "Welcome!" than with art?" commented Suwanee's Assistant City Manager Denise Brinson. "Public art has become an integral part of Suwanee's identity. It's not enough to simply create a place. That place has to come alive - through art, events, activities, and just making things fun. People need a reason to keep coming back and connecting."

"Arts and cultural activities are at the heart of Suwanee. The NGAA Center for the Arts and the City of Suwanee Welcome Center does just that, helping to bring that energy to the community."

Suwanee Police Chief Mike Jones was honored on March 14, 2019 at the State Capitol as Georgia's 2018-2019 Chief of the Year. Senators Renee Unterman and John Albers sponsored Senate Resolution 47, commending and congratulating Chief Jones for 45 years of outstanding service.

"I'm very honored and humbled to be here today," said Chief Jones. "But you can't do it by yourself. I have good people working for me, I have a wonderful wife who supports what I do, and I have a council and a mayor that supports our police department and gives us the things we need to do our jobs. We believe in community policing – building relationships with our people – and we have that in Suwanee."

Chief Jones received the recognition from the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police (GACP) at the GACP Summer Training Conference in Savannah in July 2018.

Jones began his career in law enforcement as a dispatcher with the City of Rome Police Department in 1974, working his way through the ranks all the way to Major. He accepted the position of Chief of Police with the City of Suwanee and was sworn in on January 1, 1999, after 24 years of service in Rome.

During his tenure as Chief of Police, the Suwanee Police Department has more than doubled in size. The department became CALEA accredited in 2010 - one of just 56 in Georgia - and was reaccredited in 2013 and in 2016 with Excellence. The agency received state certification in 1999 and state recertification in 2004, 2009, 2013, and 2016. In 2016 the department was awarded the Phyllis Goodwin Agency of the Year by the Georgia Chapter of the FBI National Academy Associates.

“Because of the example he provides, Chief Jones is able to demand that his department remain ethical, knowledgeable, and professional [the Suwanee PD motto] each and every shift,” remarked Officer Jeff Covert. “Chief Jones takes every opportunity to share his expectations and remind his officers that his door is always open. His genuine concern is a hallmark that continues to foster loyalty to him and his expectations, which provides the City of Suwanee a police department that benefits the entire community.”
