Super Suwanee, Super Rate City of Suwanee Saves \$3M Through Bond Refinance

The Suwanee City Council adopted a bond resolution and bond purchase agreement at their May 24, 2016 City Council meeting and voted to approve the refinancing of the city's outstanding open space bonds, resulting in savings of about \$3 million over the life of the bond for Suwanee tax payers.

Based on current market conditions and Suwanee's AAA bond rating, the city was able to forward refund the approximately \$12.3 million bond and lock-in at a 1.96 percent rate (formerly 4.3 percent) with JPMorgan Chase. This option provides a fiscal year comparison savings of about \$3 million, as well as shortening the outstanding debt from 16 to ten years.

"The City's credit and reputation again brought strong interest from the banking sector, and we received some great bids," said Amie Sakmar, City of Suwanee financial services director.


"Suwanee is thrilled to be partnering once again with JPMorgan Chase in these efforts to be good stewards of the taxpayers' money."

Last fall, the City of Suwanee refinanced 2006 revenue bonds - also with JPMorgan Chase that were used to help fund construction of Suwanee City Hall, saving the city approximately \$180,000.

"This allows us the opportunity to save the taxpayers millions of dollars by getting out-of-debt sooner," said Suwanee Mayor Jimmy Burnette. "Like the previous refunding, it's a win-win situation."

The annual Suwanee Fest races, including a children's 1K fun run, begin and finish at Town Center Park. Superhero costumes are strongly encouraged!

Registration is now available at active.com. Course maps for the 5K, which meanders through historic (and hilly) Old Town, and the 10K, which is an out-and-back route primarily on the Suwanee Creek Greenway, are available at runsuwanee.com. A Course So Nice, It's Worth Doing Twice First marathon in Gwinnett County to take place in Suwanee

The City of Suwanee is excited to announce that a full, 26.2-mile marathon is set to join the existing Suwanee Half Marathon on Sunday, February 26, 2017. The first full marathon in Gwinnett County, the inaugural Suwanee Marathon will be a double loop of the original half marathon (which will also be offered).

"It takes some creative logistics to plan a 26.2-mile route in a nine-square-mile city," said Suwanee Events Manager Amy Doherty.

It's generally recommended that those training for marathons have a base of three to six months' worth of running four times per week. Which means if you want to run the very first Suwanee Marathon in January, you need to start training...now.

"It's all about mind set and finding ways to stay motivated," said Jason Vance, the race director at Georgia Fitness (sponsor of the Suwanee Marathon and Half Marathon). "Up training for an extended period of time, especially for an event that you have never done before, can be mentally and emotionally taxing. Training is hard and monotonous, and the race can be grueling at times. But for most people, this is a once-in-a-lifetime achievement – so enjoy it."

Georgia Fitness Race Director Jason Vance offers a few tips for those ready to tackle 26.2:

YES, YOU'RE GOING TO NEED A LOT OF TRAINING

Train at least 3-4 days per week, with one of those being a longer run. Progressively increase your distances weekly or biweekly, while increasing your long run in half- to full-mile increments.

ENLIST CHEERLEADERS

Tell as many friends and family as possible that you're training. They'll help you stay motivated and keep a positive attitude. And a little peer pressure never hurt anyone – you don't want to have to explain why you quit training.

TAKE CARE OF YOURSELF

Consider this permission to hit the snooze button: Getting plenty of rest is imperative for a marathon runner. Full nights of sleep and days off after long runs, not to mention lots of stretching to prevent injury, fueling up on healthy foods, and staying hydrated at ALL times...whether you're running that day or not.

JUST KEEP SWIMMING ...ER, GOING.

Nobody is going to remember your finishing time, only that you finished. Walk if you need to; who cares? Just keep going.

Was anyone hanging out in Town Center Park May 27-28 and notice a man running by...and running by...?

Avid runner and Suwanee resident Rob Lykins wanted to do something big before his move back to his home state of Michigan – something that would "go down in history" in the Suwanee running community. But most importantly, Rob wanted to get one last epic run in with as many of his friends as he could. So he came to the conclusion that any sane person would: he decided to run 100 miles in Town Center Park.

Making 275 laps around the park to equal 100 miles, Rob started running at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, May 27. Joined by over 50 friends who served as support and running companions, he completed his 100-mile goal on Saturday, May 28 at 7:45 p.m.

"This was my third 100-mile run and it was the hardest of all three," said Lykins. "With 17 miles left I sat down and told [his wife] Catherine I was done and wanted to go home. The heat had shut me down and I was 100 percent ready to be done. No one would let me leave; I was given nothing but support and encouragement. I was only alone for eight out of 175 laps."

After his good friend and fellow 100-mile finisher Bill took Rob for a walk and "talked some sense into me," Lykins continued on toward his goal and crossed the finish line 27 hours, 15 minutes, and 15 seconds after he started.

"Words cannot express how loved I feel from so many people near and far," said Lykins. "Thank you to all the Suwanee Big Peach Runners, friends, Suwanee Town Center, and thank you to my two biggest supporters, my loves, my motivation, and my reason to keep moving: my wife Catherine and son Asher."

"This run was hard but just what I hoped it would be – time with friends."





Suwanee Youth Leader's CARE Closet Wins Multiple Awards

\$25,000 ought to stock a food pantry to the breaking point. Suwanee Youth Leader Lauren Seroyer certainly hopes so.

The Peachtree Ridge High School junior recently won the United Way Spark Prize and \$25,000 grant for creating the CARE Closet at her school: a confidential food

bank and resource center designed to help her fellow classmates in need.

Sparked by a conversation with a classmate who wasn't getting enough to eat at home, Lauren and her twin brother, Steven, worked with school counselors and her classmates to establish the CARE (Community Assistance and Resource Effort) Closet after delivering a presentation to school officials to get the go-ahead. Her classmates responded to the cry for support in spades – in less than two months, 20 families were helped with food donations.

"It took much less effort than I thought it would have to get my classmates involved," Lauren said. "As soon as they heard about my solution to this problem, I literally had people come to me asking about ways that they could contribute to the cause. In addition, I have gotten almost every single school club involved, and they have all conducted food drives, providing



the CARE Closet with great amounts of non-perishable goods."

Lauren was encouraged to submit her project for the Spark Prize, and was named one of six finalists (most of the other applicants being adults). The CARE Closet was named one of two winners, and the grant money will be used to expand the program to other local high schools. In

fact, the amount is enough to add a CARE Closet to every Gwinnett County high school. Lauren was also recently named a 2016 McDonald's 365Black Community Choice Award winner, given to exceptional African-American youth who are making a difference within their communities.

All of this led to a busy summer for Lauren: she was also chosen as an ANNPower Fellow which included a four-day leadership program in New York City; a trip to New Orleans in July to accept the 365Black Community Choice Award at the Essence Festival, and attending the Atlanta Community Food Bank Youth Summit with her brother to learn more about hunger issues and how they can help.

"We just want to do what we can to help whoever we can. It feels good to help. No kid should wake up wondering when they're going to eat again," said Steven.

City Launches Historic District Self-Guided Tour

Although currently known for its community vibe, world-class Town Center Park development, and high quality-of-life, the City of Suwanee originated from humble beginnings. Some sources say "Suwanee" began as a Shawnee Indian village about three miles southwest of the current downtown area. The federal government officially recognized Suwanee as a place when the Suwanee Post Office was established in 1838. As is the case with many communities in our area, Suwanee's growth is tied to the evolution of transportation. A small agricultural town with strong ties to the railroad eventually grew to become the community we know and love today.

The City of Suwanee has numerous historical landmarks, specifically in the Old Town Suwanee area. This approximately 56-acre historic district contains both commercial and residential areas dating from around 1871 to the early 1960s, which are primarily oriented in a linear fashion along Main

Street and run parallel to the Norfolk Southern railroad corridor.

Stop by **Suwanee City** Hall and pick up one of our new historic landmark brochures,



complete with a self-guided tour through the historic district, including the 1910 Suwanee First Methodist Church, Pierce's Corner, and the former hotel that now houses Huthmaker Violins.



Dewey the Library? Yes We Do!

All 15 branches of the Gwinnett County Public Library (GCPL) system – including the Suwanee branch – were recently updated with new technology and simplified hours.

"Our new Bibliotheca self-checkout kiosks will be capable of much more than checking out a book," Michael Casey, GCPL's director of information technology, said in a news release. "Customers will be able to pay for their copies, print jobs and late fees, and purchase items like tote bags and flash drives directly on the machines. With updates to the software later

this year, the kiosks will make recommendations based on the user's browsing history."

Other technology upgrades include workroom check-in stations, entrance security gates, and iPads and portable computing stations that will allow the library staff to be more mobile.

In Remembrance of 9/11

The City of Suwanee will remember those lost in the tragic 9/11 terrorist attack at a Remembrance Day ceremony on the 15th anniversary of the event on Sunday, September 11, 2016. The event will take place at the *Remembrance* public art piece, located on the east side of Town Center Park near Lawrenceville-Suwanee Road. A special music presentation will open the ceremony with a medley of patriotic songs, followed by the presentation of colors by the Gwinnett Fire Department.

"This event will provide a moment to pause and reflect on who we are as a nation," said Suwanee Events & Outreach Manager Amy Doherty. "We want to honor our heroes and reflect on the significance of what this day means to our community."

Suwanee's Remembrance exhibit offers an example of art as history. Unveiled September 11, 2013, the display at Town Center Park features a damaged, twisted relic from one of the World Trade Center towers, which was given to Suwanee by the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. Created by Statesboro artist Marc Moulton, the display also includes a 9/11 historical timeline with stainless steel letters and numbers embedded into a cement pad as well as an inverted conical sculpture, with the lower Manhattan cityscape cut into it. At night, a light-shadow impression, which offers an aerial view of the cityscape, is projected onto the pad.

The City of Suwanee currently has multiple projects underway this summer. Here's a quick look at a few of the ones we get the most questions about:

SIMS LAKE DOCK

Yes, the rumors are true: Sims Lake is getting a dock. A 60' bridge will be constructed on the southeastern portion of the lake, ending at a 32' x 16' covered dock with benches. Amaysing (locally known as the DeLay Services Incorporated is currently slated to begin construction in October. Please note that fishing and watercrafts will still notSuwanee library and PlayTown be allowed in Sims Lake.

NEW SIDEWALKS

Students will be able to walk to North Gwinnett High School a little easier this fall, thanks to new sidewalks on Suwanee Dam Road from Brinsworth Drive to Moore/Level Creek Road. Smithtown Road will also receive new sidewalks, connecting Lawrenceville-Suwanee Road to Satellite Boulevard.

WAYFINDING SIGNAGE

Citizens and visitors alike will begin noticing new wayfinding signage throughout city, alerting travelers to city and county parks, Suwanee's historic downtown, and other notable locations.

"While the only real job of wayfinding signage is to tell people where they are, where their destination is, and how to connect those two points, it can do so much more," said Assistant City Manager Denise Brinson. "In addition to basic navigation, our wayfinding signage introduces the 'personality' of Suwanee and connects to our brand."

TOWN CENTER WEST **Future Planning**

The approximate 20-acre site Property) located behind the Suwanee on Lawrenceville-Suwanee Road, is set to be the City of Suwanee's next great park. Purchased in 2002 as a future park site, the property was an early acquisition in the Open Space Initiative.

City officials spent the summer collecting input from citizens on what they would like to see this park become, via live surveying at events and man-on-the-street style interviews, an online survey, and stakeholder interviews.

"The type and character of this park is still to be determined. The proximity to Town Center provides an opportunity to enhance both locations," said Allen. "We're hoping that the community can help us with creative ideas that have not been done in our region. By engaging the public, we hope to make this space another one of Suwanee's great places."




