The City of Suwanee has announced the re-launch of the Art for All capital campaign for public art. The campaign originally launched in June 2019, raising over \$550,000 before being temporarily suspended during the pandemic crisis of 2020.

"The city recently celebrated the groundbreaking of the new Town Center on Main & DeLay Nature Park," said Suwanee Assistant City Manager Denise Brinson. "With that, it's time to resume raising money for the icing on the proverbial cake!"

In 2018, the city competed a fundraising feasibility study and embarked on a capital campaign to raise \$1.25M in private contributions to support the inclusion of three new public art pieces to be located in Town Center on Main. These pieces – an interactive, signature installation, a gateway entrance piece, and a mural installation in the railroad underpass – will provide the margin of excellence above and beyond the basic infrastructure of the park, and act as a catalyst to transform the project from a park to a place.

"What is so remarkable about the success of Suwanee's art program is that it has been accomplished primarily with private funding," said Brinson. "While the city provides the infrastructure of new parks and green spaces, it is the support of private citizens and businesses that provides the public art that has played such a significant role in what Suwanee does, what Suwanee is, and how Suwanee is viewed."



CITY OF SUWANEE CITY CLERK AND ELECTION SUPERINTENDEN

Since the City of Suwanee **does not have a municipal general election in 2022,** now is a good time to take a deeper dive into the minutiae of how the election process usually works!



It all seemed so simple when we were voting for our 8th grade class president: check the name on the ballot, put the ballot in the box, count the ballots. But as you have probably ascertained from the last few years, the reality of elections is a little more complicated.

A few things that are helpful to know:
Municipal general elections are held on oddnumbered years (no municipal elections in 2022!).
The Suwanee Mayor and City Councilmembers
serve four-year terms, and are elected on
staggered years – for example, three seats were
elected in 2021 and the other three will be elected
in 2023. The Mayor and Council serve at-large
(serve the city as a whole) and are bipartisan.

The exception to the odd-numbered year elections would be a special election. This would be for electing someone to complete the term of an existing councilmember that needs to resign, or if the city needs to bring a special referendum to the residents earlier than what a general election would allow.

Now that all of that is cleared up, it's time to have an election! Just some paper ballots and a box, right? Well....



The election superintendent's role is to understand and adhere to state laws, as well as changes to those laws during the election cycle. During an election cycle, I am responsible for meeting deadlines for advertisements and filings, as well as reporting to the Secretary of State's office.



While the public starts to notice election happenings beginning with the qualifying period in August, for an election superintendent the process begins in January! In Suwanee, the election superintendent is sworn in during the City Council's January meeting. The election superintendent must be certified by training conducted by the Secretary of State's office, and then must complete recertification every election cycle thereafter.

The council must issue a resolution to conduct the election, set the qualifying fees, and to set the dates for the qualifying period at their January meeting. By law, the election qualifying period and qualifying fees must be advertised no later than February 1 of the General Election year. Speaking of qualifying....



The qualifying period is when candidates "throw their hat in the ring" and have their name appear on the ballot. Would-be candidates must provide a Notice of Candidacy and payment of the qualifying fee. Now that we have candidates, it's time to...

STEP 4 COOL AND ELE

COORDINATE AND MAINTAIN ELECTION MATERIALS

Section 203 of the Voting Rights Act requires jurisdictions with certain population numbers to provide bilingual voting materials in the language of the minority population. As of 2017, Gwinnett County and its municipalities have been required to provide for voter registrations and elections in both English and Spanish. The election call, website verbiage, election results, advertisements, forms, applications, envelopes, and signage all must be translated in order to ensure that bilingual voters with limited-English proficiency can effectively and actively participate in the election process.



COORDINATES ADVANCED VOTING

Next, the election superintendent coordinates and holds three weeks of advanced voting, as well as voting on election day, which is the Tuesday after the first Monday in November (so complicated!). We have to hire, train, and schedule poll officials for the entirety of the voting period.



ELECTION DAY

Hooray, it's here! After trouble-shooting throughout the day, I coordinate and assist poll officials in hand-counting paper ballots once the polls close. This includes advanced in-person ballots, absentee ballots, and ballots cast on election day. These findings are announced as "uncertified results."



THE NEXT FIVE DAYS

The election superintendent spends the next five days reviewing and completing all summary forms necessary for official submittal, cross referencing the number of ballots printed to the number of ballots cast for accuracy, and preparing documents and reports to be sent to the County Registrar's Office and the Secretary of State's office. After five days, final certification of the election is announced.

STEP 8 SEVEN WEEKS LATER

At their December meeting, City Council ratifies the election certification, and the new candidates are sworn in at the January Council meeting.

And that's it! Eight simple steps – and 11 months – later, you've successfully elected a council to help cast a broad vision for the city and fashion and adopt policies and ordinances that forward that vision (but not this year – there are no elections at City Hall in 2022). A lot more complicated than electing an 8th grade class president, but arguably much more rewarding as well.



ON TOWN CENTER ON MAIN + DELAY NATURE PARK

The City of Suwanee broke ground September 26 on the highly anticipated Town Center on Main and DeLay Nature Park. Mayor Jimmy Burnette, the City Council, representatives from Reeves Young, Clark Patterson Lee, the Gwinnett County Library, and other community members were on hand for the ceremonial groundbreaking.

The 25-acre site was purchased in 2002 as an early acquisition of the community-driven open space initiative. The Suwanee City Council unanimously approved a master plan for a future city park in 2019.

The dual parks will transform the area, creating a campus-like environment that encompass the Suwanee library, PlayTown Suwanee, and Fire Station 13. The rerouting of Main Street and closure of the median on Suwanee Dam Road is a key part of bringing these elements together into one cohesive space.

Town Center on Main is designed as an urbanstyle greenspace with a unique character, personality, and purpose, similar to but separate from the existing Town Center Park. The Suwanee library will serve as the anchor for this new space much like the way City Hall relates to the existing park. The majority of the site – roughly 15 of the wooded 25 acres containing the Brushy Creek Greenway – will remain largely undisturbed as the DeLay Nature Park.

Once completed, Town Center Park and Town Center on Main will function as a unified space, linked by Station Park (located next to the police station) and the pedestrian tunnel under the railroad. The topography of the new park will allow it to overlook Town Center, further enhancing the relationship of the two spaces.

A big change this area will see is the realignment of Main Street, which will shift around the park and exit onto Suwanee Dam Road at the traffic signal in front of Shadowbrook Baptist Church and the new Gwinnett County fire station (currently under construction). This shift will allow for the closing of the median break on Suwanee Dam Road at Main Street, greatly improving safety and traffic flow.

The City of Suwanee won two Georgia Downtown Excellence Awards in the categories of Creative New Event for Glow in the Park with the Atlanta International Night Market and Outstanding Promotional Campaign for the 2021 Annual Report. GDA presented the awards to the city on August 24 at its annual conference in Macon.

Now in its fifth year, Glow in the Park lantern parade and concert is an established event that was elevated with the addition of the Atlanta International Night Market. The partnership capitalized on the unique and popular aspects of each event, resulting in a record 55,000 attendees, second only to Suwanee Fest.

GDA recognized Suwanee's 2021 Annual Report as an Outstanding Promotional Campaign. Much like the beloved 'The Game of Life,' *LIFE in Suwanee* follows the road through the city, past community landmarks, navigates around issues, and hits all the highlights along the way. The Downtown Excellence Awards recognize and promote the outstanding achievements of local downtown development and revitalizing organizations in Georgia's communities. Sixty-four nominations were submitted across four categories in 2022.



Partnership Gwinnett and Council for Quality Growth Honor **Suwanee Redevelopment**

Partnership Gwinnett and the Council for Quality Growth recognized Solis I and II - a Suwanee Town Center mixed-use development - as the Large Redevelopment of the Year at the 12th Annual Metro Atlanta Redevelopment Summit on October 13.

Solis I and II (now Siena and Skye, respectively) are the result of a public-private partnership between Terwilliger Pappas and the City of Suwanee.

Located on Buford Highway near Town Center Park, the project features a combined 473 upscale apartment units and 22,000 square feet of ground floor retail space. "With the addition of these two mixeduse developments to the downtown Suwanee scene, the city's vibrancy has expanded beyond Town Center," said Suwanee Downtown Development Authority president Kevin O'Brien. "This expansion of a walkable, live-work-play district continues Suwanee's reputation as a unique community in the Metro Atlanta area."

Other finalists in the category included Clayton County Public Schools Arena, Empire Zephyr, Hugh Howell Marketplace Center, and Westside Paper. The City of Suwanee was also a finalist in the Small Redevelopment of the Year category for StillFire Brewing and Station Park.



More than 200 business, community and industry leaders attended the regional redevelopment event that awards industry leaders, highlights current projects, and shares revitalization best practices and trends. The awards ceremony recognized exceptional projects that have a significant economic impact.



2022 Savuy Award WINNER

The City-County Communications & Marketing Association (3CMA) announced the City of Suwanee 2021 Annual Report as the national Savvy Award winner in the category of Printed Publications at the 3CMA Annual Conference. This is the City of Suwanee's second Savvy Award, having previously won for the annual report in 2018.

The Savvy Awards recognize outstanding local government achievements in communications, public-sector marketing, and citizen-government relationships. The awards salute skilled and effective city, county, agency, or district professionals who creatively executed innovations in communications and marketing. Over 640 entries in 39 categories were submitted for Savvy Awards this year.



Suwanee Now Accepting Applications for 2023 Event Calendar

The City of Suwanee is now accepting applications for community events to be hosted at city parks during 2023. The deadline for applications is December 1. Once the event schedule is approved after the first of the year, no additional events may be added.

Each year, Suwanee hosts – primarily at Town Center Park – over 40 city- and privately-planned events, including concerts, festivals, races, food truck events, and more.

"Events are an important part of community-building in Suwanee," said Events and Outreach Manager Amy Doherty. "Each year, we love partnering with community organizations to bring great music, fun events, and unique engagement opportunities to our residents."

Applications and guidelines are available at **Suwanee.com.** Acceptance of an application does not constitute approval of an event. Applicants will be contacted regarding their submission by mid-January 2023; selected applicants are expected to attend the mandatory event planning meeting in late January.

HIDDEN SUWANEE:

The Berlin Wall



Like the rest of post-World War II Germany, the capitol city of Berlin was divided for administrative purposes among the Allied victors. East Germany became a totalitarian police state, and in 1961, the communist government built a wall dividing the city. 100,000 people attempted to safely defect between 1961 and 1989; 5,000 succeeded. Between 125 and 200 lost their lives in the attempt.

The Berlin Wall was opened in November 9, 1989; demolition began in June 1990, making way for German reunification later that year. Euphoric citizens and souvenir hunters chipped away parts of the Wall; industrial equipment was later used to remove most of what was left.

Today, an authenticated piece of the Berlin Wall stands in Suwanee Town Center. Purchased at an auction in 2013, owners Ray Stanjevich and Suzanne Cartwright donated the 12-foot-tall, 7,000-pound piece to the city's permanent art collection in August 2018.

Originally discovered in an East Berlin work camp, the oncewestern-facing section features graffiti depicting an American flag, a silhouetted figure, and three buildings. The side that once faced East Berlin is mostly devoid of graffiti. The piece has a certificate of authenticity after tests on the concrete and rebar confirmed its materials consistent with those used in Germany in the early 1960s.

"I was born in a communist country, and Suzanne's mother immigrated from Germany after World War II," said Stanjevich, a Serbian immigrant. "We think it's important to remember the past and not forget that many still live without the basic freedoms that we enjoy in the United States."


