

NOW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FOR SPRING 2023 SESSION

Who wants a hands-on learning opportunity to better understand what it's like to be a police officer? Get a glimpse behind the badge through the Suwanee Citizens Police Academy: an eight-week program designed to give the public working knowledge of the risks, responsibilities, and day-to-day functions of the Suwanee Police Department.

The academy offers classroom training and hands-on experiences in crime scene processing, traffic stops, building searches, crime prevention, and narcotics identification, as well as an opportunity to patrol Suwanee alongside an officer.

"I learned more about local government in those eight weeks at the Citizens Police Academy than in my previous 30 years," said a Suwanee Citizens Police Academy graduate. "The academy provided a fascinating look into the problems – and solutions – of police work."

The spring Suwanee Citizens Police Academy session will be offered on Monday evenings, April 3 through May 22, 2023 from 6:30-9:00 pm at the Suwanee Police Substation at 2966 Lawrenceville-Suwanee Road. Classes are free to the public, but space is limited and preference is given to Suwanee residents or those who work in the City of Suwanee. A criminal and driver history background is required for all applicants.

Notarized applications will be accepted at the Suwanee Police Station **until March 20, 2023 at 5 pm.**Visit Suwanee.com or scan the QR for an application and more information.

The City of Suwanee honored Bryan Cohen, CEO of Quantum Bank, as a Friend of Suwanee at the January 24 City Council meeting for his history of contributions to our city.

The Friend of Suwanee Award is the highest honor conferred upon an individual or group by the Mayor and Council for the City of Suwanee. The award salutes dedication and commitment to Suwanee and recognizes the recipient for substantial contributions, extraordinary leadership, commitment, and vision.

Cohen spearheaded Quantum's recent donation to the city's Art for All public art campaign. The bank is also a founding sponsor of SculpTour and of multiple city events. Cohen served on the ad-hoc committee that evolved into Suwanee's Public Art Commission and laid the groundwork for the public art initiative.

Prior to his 14 years with Quantum, Cohen spent 23 years as president of Touchstone Homes. Cohen was integral in developing much of the commercial space along Satellite Boulevard, creating an important employment center for our community. He also developed Village Grove, which was the first neighborhood to include public art (predating the city's public art initiative!) and initiated Touchstone's donation of land for a significant portion of the Suwanee Creek Greenway.

"Every successful town has an individual who makes an exponential impact on their community," said Allen at the January council meeting. "People will look back and point to Bryan Cohen as someone who helped guide and define Suwanee."

Take a Load Off IN SUWANEE'S PUBLIC PARKLETS

Visitors to Town Center have likely noticed the new outdoor places to sit, eat, and just enjoy! Two new public "parklets" provide more outdoor relaxation spots for all patrons of Suwanee Town Center. One parklet is located in front of Pulse Nail Bar by Brown Bag Deli, with the second near Café Amico and Golden Seven.

Parklets are sidewalk extensions that convert curbside parking spaces into vibrant community spaces. Also known as street seats or curbside seating, these mini gathering spaces provide additional seating and tables to create a relaxing atmosphere for everyone.

Enhanced outdoor seating options are trending, and Town Center Avenue shops previously offered only designated bistro tables that belong to the restaurants; in other words, there was no option for the public to stop and "sit a spell." Suwanee's compact parklets were specifically designed to offer more types of seating with an aesthetic that fits with the style and character of Town Center Park.





In an effort to streamline the training process for new officers, the Suwanee Police Department has collaborated with other agencies to develop a local police training academy. Housed at the University of North Georgia, the academy is staffed by seasoned officers from participating agencies such as the City of Suwanee and the Forsyth, Hall, and Pickens County Sheriffs' offices.

This new regional academy provides the traditional 11-week basic training period, as well as a an additional sixweek training period to have new officers ready to hit the ground running. The first class of officers graduated from the academy on January 20, 2023.

"Scheduling officers into different academies throughout the state for advanced training is a challenge for all agencies," said Suwanee Police Captain Dwayne Black. "Some of the extra training the new academy offers includes advanced patrol rifle, speed detection, standardized field sobriety, and Taser certification."

ATLANTA REGIONAL COMMISSION

RECOGNIZES SUWANEE FOR CONTINUED COMMITMENT TO SUSTAINABILITY

The Atlanta Regional Commission (ARC) upgraded the City of Suwanee to silver certification through the agency's Green Communities Program for demonstrating leadership in sustainability practices. Suwanee earned certification points for working with Georgia Power to retrofit all existing streetlights with LED lamps, which use 50–75 percent less energy.

"We've woven green initiatives into our long-term strategic plans for the city; being responsible environmental stewards is part of the fabric of Suwanee," said Billqeece Naqawe, Assistant to the City Manager. "ARC's Green Communities Program encourages municipalities to build a more sustainable future."

ARC developed the Green Communities Program in 2009 to recognize local governments that invest in programs and policies that lead to a more sustainable region. The nationally recognized program showcases the many ways that local governments can reduce their environmental footprint.

"The 2022 Green Communities have played an instrumental role in moving metro Atlanta towards greater sustainability and environmental resilience through innovative and community-informed projects," said ARC Natural Resources Managing Director Katherine Zitsch. "These communities demonstrate exemplary dedication to building a stronger, greener region."

In metro Atlanta, 16 local governments — 11 cities and five counties — are currently certified under ARC's Green Communities Program. This is the first program in the country to promote sustainability through a certification program for local governments.





Local Cultural Assets SUWANEE METHODIST CHURCH

espite the name, the was originally home to both the Methodist and Baptist churches. When the building opened in 1879, preachers were limited and services were held sporadically; this arrangement allowed congregants to attend whenever a pastor was available.

The aging structure fell into poor condition until it was completely destroyed during a windstorm in 1909. The board of trustees made the decision to relocate and rebuild, making the move from the west end of Main Street to the hill top

of Scales Road in 1910, where Suwanee Methodist Church it still sits today. M. Gus Jones was contracted to build the new church for \$2,000. Member Charlie Craft hauled salvaged lumber from the original structure to the new location using an ox team.

> As Suwanee grew, the church grew. By 1952, three additional classrooms had been constructed just to teach religious studies; by 1960, the church had reached 70 members. In 1974, the church hired its first full-time pastor. The Suwanee Methodist Church bells still ring on Sunday mornings.

TO SUWANEE'S PUBLIC ART PROGRAM

Representatives from Quantum National Bank presented a check for \$100,000 to the City of Suwanee's Art for All campaign at the Suwanee City Council meeting on January 24, 2023.

The first major pledge to the public art campaign, Quantum's donation will support three signature public art pieces in Town Center on Main, Suwanee's newest park that is currently under construction.

"Suwanee has been our home since our founding over 20 years ago," said Quantum CEO Bryan Cohen. "We've watched the city grow and prosper along with our bank. We appreciate the partnership we have with the city and are happy to be part of this exciting campaign."

Suwanee Spirit Stones Spotted in Suwanee Parks & Trails

The dogwoods have bloomed. The azaleas have peaked. And any day now, art pieces will be popping up along the city greenway, trails, and parks as Suwanee celebrates its annual finders-keepers Art on a Limb program. Through Art on a Limb, two pieces of art are hidden daily along one of the greenways or within city parks throughout the month of May. Those who find the art pieces get to keep them!

This year's art is the Suwanee Spirit Stone, created by Ray and Jeannie Terhune of Crafty Creations. The Spirit Stones are an actual stone, covered with polymer clay and embellished with small crystals. Each piece of art takes approximately one hour to create.

"I began working with polymer clay over ten years ago. I began with dimensional jewelry forms; the "critters" were a natural progression," said Jeannie. "All of my creations are molded by hand from a nontoxic sculpting material made of PVC resin. Once cured, the pieces are water- and faderesistant; they are somewhat fragile, so should be handled with care."

The Peachtree Corners-based handcrafted sculpture and jewelry business has been a Suwanee Fest regular since 2018. Suwanee Event & Outreach Manager Amy Doherty spotted the original stones - psychedelic, tiedyed 'Pot Rocks' - at the festival in 2022 and asked Jeannie to create a specific stone for Art of a Limb. Each Spirit Stones features a Suwanee 'S' and a polymer clay "limb." Found Spirit Stones can be displayed anywhere, but are designed to be "guardians" for plants in pots or in the garden.




