Suwanee Announces NEW Community-Build Playground

Over a five-day period in 2004, more than 1,000 community members helped build a community playground that came to be known as PlayTown Suwanee. Let's do it again!

Building upon the success of PlayTown Suwanee nearly 20 years ago, the city is excited to announce plans for a new community-build playground in the fall of 2023! The city has approved Leathers & Associates - the designer and project management team behind the original community build - to return to help modernize PlayTown Suwanee for a new generation.

"After 20 years of fun, PlayTown has reached the end of its planned service life," said Suwanee City Manager Marty Allen. "We explored rehabbing it, but ultimately it made even more sense to rebuild it with modern, durable materials and incorporate some new features."

The collective build experience offers a handson opportunity for citizens to give something tangible back to their community, resulting in a beautifully constructed, unique expression of shared pride. The project team hosted design brainstorming sessions with the ultimate playground experts: kids! Representatives visited select classrooms in elementary schools within the city limits to gather ideas; children were also invited to submit their ideas via Suwanee.com.

The custom-designed playground will be built in the same location and similarly sized as the original. It will be designed to meet modern standards for inclusivity and constructed from earth-friendly, recycled materials that are long lasting and virtually maintenance-free.

"Playground trends have come a long way in 20 years," said PlayTown project manager Kim Towne. "With the construction of Town Center on Main, this seemed like the perfect time to give our beloved PlayTown a much-needed facelift, while also providing a new generation of parents the opportunity to be involved in a truly impactful project."

Assuming you have a thoroughly vetted business plan, all you'll need now is a funding mechanism, business location, a legal structure, federal and state tax IDs, industry and state licenses and permits....

Yes, entrepreneurship is complicated. But we have great news: the City of Suwanee business services department is here to help aspiring entrepreneurs navigate the journey from great idea to great business.

At Suwanee City Hall, our staff is eager to help guide those seeking new business ventures within the city limits. We believe that the resources within Suwanee and the greater Gwinnett County area can assist entrepreneurs from all walks of life in understanding the community and providing guidance on the pathway to a successful business.

Gwinnett County is home to multiple organizations that support aspiring entrepreneurs. These organizations possess valuable insight into the community, assist with networking opportunities, and offer guidance on how to establish a successful and thriving business.

Gwinnett Chamber of Commerce The Chamber provides opportunities for like-minded business people to connect, expand their business network, and increase the exposure of their business. The Chamber offers opportunities to learn about issues and best practices related to running a successful business at over 250 events annually. - Copy of a secure and verifiable identification document (i.e., an official ID)
- North American Industry Classification System code (NAICS)
- Articles of corporation
- Federal Tax Identification Number (EIN)
- State Sales and Use Tax Certification
- Fire Marshal Certification of Occupancy

Please do not hesitate to contact us for guidance and support as you embark on your entrepreneurial journey in Suwanee. NORTH GWINNETT SENIOR NAMED REGION 3A

STAR STUDENT

The Professional Association of Georgia Educators Foundation announced Aditi Venkatesh, a senior at North Gwinnett High School, as the 2023 Region 3A STAR Student. STAR Students are the seniors in the top percent of their class with the highest SAT score.

Venkatesh was named Gwinnett's STAR Student in February, besting 75 students across 32 Gwinnett schools, and topping 20 other winners region level.

Venkatesh chose to honor Ms. Katie Massey as their STAR Teacher. Each STAR Student selects a teacher to recognize as the educator with a strong influence on their academic career. Venkatesh was also part of the Suwanee Youth Leaders Class of 2022.







Local Cultural Assets JACKSON STREET CEMETERY

n Jackson Street in Old Town Suwanee,
a plot now known as the Jackson Street
Cemetery has served the local African
American community since the 1800s.

After the land was officially deeded to "the Colored People of Suwanee" by landowner J.H. Scales in 1919, Suwanee Grove United Methodist Church – the first African American church in Suwanee – managed the cemetery. Upon the death of the deed holder, Mrs. Juanita Meriday,

the City of Suwanee assumed responsibility for maintaining the grounds, working to appropriately demarcate and identify gravesites, and ensure that the appropriate care due to a sacred space is provided.

Among the many African American Suwanee citizens buried in Jackson Street Cemetery are soldiers, landowners, entrepreneurs, and General Motors workers. Notably, it is also the final resting place of WWII veteran Grady Daniel, who was the first African American to serve on the Suwanee City Council.

Suwanee Historic Downtown Preservation Initiative

As her Girl Scout Gold Award Project, Ashlee Tam spent several months identifying Suwanee's local cultural assets, researching and writing about them, and interviewing "local legends" who impacted people and places (and some place names) in Suwanee.

sets, and our community's most talented student actors and actresses.



Adirondack chairs, and a stairway mural featuring narwhals and the quote, "Be so amazing that people think you're a myth." The SYL Cheers Committee spent countless hours designing, planning, fundraising, and creating the Cheers Spot.

Each SYL class chooses a Cheers Project (or service project) to

give back to the community. The Cheers Project is dedicated to the memory of Adam Edge, a former city employee and co-founder of the SYL program. Dedicated to youth and the community, Adam always had time to "hang" with his SYLiens; the Class of 2022 envisioned a space for youth to continue to gather and spread positivity.



Last fall, the City of Suwanee sent out the call for old trophies and other outdated relics of past glory. Expecting a few hundred, the city received a few thousand; they were delivered by the truckload to artist Phil Proctor to create an aweinspiring, giant trophy out of many: the Ultimate Participation Trophy! The new public art piece was unveiled in Town Center Park on Saturday, April 29 at 1:00 pm during the Suwanee Arts Festival.

"I asked my kids if they want their old trophies, and the answer was a hard no," said Suwanee Assistant City Manager and empty nester Denise Brinson. "As a parent, it's hard to just throw them away. This project gives those mementos a meaningful purpose and second life."



Funding for this project was provided by a grant from Gwinnett Creativity Fund, which works to provide support for arts and cultural initiatives within Gwinnett County. The Gwinnett Creativity Fund is supported by Gwinnett County and managed and administered by Explore Gwinnett.

SUWANEE POLICE LIEUTENANT COMPLETES

Suwanee Police Lieutenant Bryan Hickey recently completed the prestigious FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia. The ten-week program provides leadership, communication, and fitness training for law enforcement agents from all over the world. The class included agents from 28 countries, four military organizations, and five federal civilian organizations.

Lieutenant Hickey has been on a long waiting list, having applied for the National Academy in 2013. Only five participants are chosen from the state each quarter. Lieutenant Hickey joins Chief Cass Mooney as the only other Suwanee Police graduate.

"Less than one percent of all law enforcement leaders in the U.S. are able to attend the academy, so it's a pretty big honor for me," said Hickey.

Hosted in the facility that trains FBI special agents and intelligence analysts, Lieutenant Hickey was able to learn from academy instructors, special agents, and other staff.

"Classes were great because you're learning from experts in the field," said Hickey. "All the instructors were FBI agents that are later into their careers or retired, and each one had a wealth of knowledge."


As the Suwanee Police Training Director and leader of the Special Response Unit, Lieutenant Hickey really enjoyed the class on crisis negotiations, as it provided new insight into his work.

"The crisis negotiation course gave me tools that I can use in evaluation and how to deal with higher risk situations," Hickey states.

Another aspect of the Academy that Lieutenant Hickey enjoyed was the comradery and networking that afforded the opportunity to meet law enforcement from agencies in different states and countries.

"You're interacting with all different personnel from all over the states and world. It gives it a different dynamic. It helps give you a different perspective that you may not have had prior to."


