

Suwanee Town Center Park is set to come alive with the 19th Annual August Concert on Saturday, August 12, featuring a headline performance by alternative rock band Sister Hazel!

Mental Health Clinician Co-Responder Program

In an effort to provide a more well-rounded approach to mental health or other related incidents that are not necessarily in the criminal realm, the Suwanee Police implemented a behavioral health unit, also known as Suwanee Cares.

Suwanee Cares partners police officers with trained mental health clinicians from View Point Health. When a call is received pertaining to a possible mental health situation, both the officer and clinician are dispatched together. This partnership frees up officers to handle criminal behaviors, and helps the mentally ill in our community to get the help that they might not have received otherwise. Clinicians also have the unique capability to follow-up with patients and provide specific resources.

"The main reason this program was implemented is the rise in homelessness and mental health issues; police officers aren't traditionally trained in handling these situations," said Suwanee Police Captain Dwayne Black, who oversees the program. "We needed to come up with a way to handle such incidents with care and compassion while also keeping everyone safe."

Rockdale, Newton, Dekalb, and Cobb counties have similar programs that allow clinicians and officers to work together to help those experiencing a mental health crisis.

"Some of the positive results have been that I was able to get individuals linked with care, some who have not had mental health treatment in years," said Pamela Webb, a partnering clinician. "I have been able to divert a suicide attempt, I've helped individuals with housing, clothes, and mental health resources."



"In the first year of the program, we've responded to over 125 call from people in crisis. The clinicians have given VA referrals to homeless veterans, drug and alcohol counseling, and provided 15 consultations with Home First Gwinnett where they attempt to help find temporary lodging. They've also helped three suicidal individuals get the help they needed."

CANDIDATE QUALIFYING DATES SET FOR COUNCIL POSTS

The qualifying period for Suwanee City Council positions expected to be on the November 7, 2023 ballot will take place August 21-23, 2023. Residents interested in running for a four-year term as a city council member must first officially qualify at City Hall between 8:30 am and 4:30 pm on the dates specified. Qualifying closes at 4:30 pm on August 23.

Mayor, City Council Post 1, and City Council Post 2 are up for election this fall. Jimmy Burnette currently serves as the Mayor of Suwanee; Heather Hall currently occupies Post 1; Larry Pettiford currently occupies Post 2. Elections for Mayor and City Council posts are non-partisan.

The qualifying fee is \$270 for city council positions and \$450 for the position of mayor.

Honor Your Service Member with a Commemorative Plaque

The City of Suwanee's newest park, Town Center on Main, will be home to a number of unique features, including a veterans memorial. The memorial, *Greater Good*, will be incorporated into a water feature within the park. The park is currently under construction, with an estimated completion date of

The city is offering Suwanee residents and business owners an opportunity to honor and recognize loved ones, living or deceased, who have served or are currently serving our nation through any military branch by purchasing a plaque that will be incorporated into the memorial.

The 8" x 4" etched stainless steel plagues will be installed on the walls of the walkway leading to the memorial. Each plaque can accommodate up to four lines of text with 30 characters per line. There is an option to include more than one name per plaque in order to recognize multiple service members.

A maximum of 300 plagues will be sold on a first-come firstserved basis, with priority given to City of Suwanee residents and business owners. Service members are not required to call Suwanee home in order to be commemorated with a plague. The cost per plaque is \$300 with a limit of two plaques per purchaser. Orders will open at 8 am on September 1, 2023 at Suwanee.com.

Local Cultural Assets

Currently home to Huthmaker Violins, the stately folk Victorian home on Russell Street was built in 1880 by Daniel Born for his daughter, Lillie, and her husband, Henry Rhodes. Henry served as the head of the Suwanee School Board as well as the railroad depot agent

The couple remodeled the home throughout the years, adding guest rooms to create Suwanee's first hotel. The 4,000-square-foot house was conveniently located near the train depot and boasts eight fireplaces, seven bedrooms, three parlors, wraparound porches, and a carriage house. With amenities ranging from carriage rides to homemade dinners, the Rhodes Hotel was known as one of the finest places to stay on the line.

The Rhodes Hotel served as a respite for travelers, particularly local teachers, who would reside in the hotel during the week and take the train home to Atlanta on the weekends. Gone with the Wind author Margaret Mitchell was a frequent guest, using Suwanee as an escape from the Atlanta society gossip.

The human resources department individually reviews each application/resume before qualified applicants are forwarded to the hiring manager in the department. Once we get the right person for the job, human resources works to get them acclimated to their new role as quickly as possible. JUST KEEP SWIMMING

One would think Tom Owens was a lifetime runner. But the 65-year-old athlete began training for his first race - the 1997 Peachtree Road Race - at age 39. Approximately 300 races later, Owens secured local bragging rights in May as the first person to complete the 2023 Suwanee Running Series.

The City of Suwanee hosts nearly 20 races in Town Center and on the Suwanee Greenway annually; those who compete in five within the year complete the Suwanee Running Series.

"When I was younger and really into it, I did 15-20 miles a week. Then I'd go do a race on the weekends, even during the winter," Owens said.

But life got in the way, including raising children, becoming involved with Scouts, and even suffering a heart attack in 2000. Like many of us, Owens rediscovered running during the pandemic.

"I found the Suwanee Running Series and I thought, 'hey, I could do that," said Owens, who was also one of the first to complete the inaugural running series in 2022.

Owens enjoys the Suwanee Running Series because it's not just about running; he likes that the events are connected to a charity, and he can help give back to a good cause. Though he has already completed the 2023 running series, he plans on running more Suwanee 5ks. Owens' goal is just to keep going, and maybe inspire others to get started as well.

"My son and his wife have started running - they did the Old Town 5k and Go Gray for A Cure with me this year."

He says that it's not about how fast you are; it's about doing it for yourself and finishing the race.

Summer Porch Jam attendees and visitors noticed a few additions to historic downtown Suwanee this summer. The city recently completed a project that included signs at various locations of historical significance throughout Old Town Suwanee.

After careful consideration, the city selected six local cultural assets of historical significance to receive informative signage:

- Suwanee Methodist Church
- Pierce's Corner
- Suwanee Caboose
- Everett's Music Barn
- Rhodes Hotel
- Jackson Street Cemetery

Each location represents an important piece of Suwanee's history. Many of the sites served as community gathering places with historical significance dating back to the early days of the

city in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

The signage features text and photos that tie the history of Suwanee with the current character and feel of today. QR codes on the signs link to more detailed information about each location, including informative videos.

Ashlee Tam conducted the historical research that laid the foundation for this project as part of Suwanee's Historic Downtown Preservation Initiative and her Girl Scout Gold Award Project.

Local metal fabricators Metal Products Company volunteered to create the metal bases of the new historic signs. Founded in 1941, Metal Products Company got its start making parts for Liberty Ships during World War II, but moved on to petroleum tanks after the war ended. In 1978, the business moved from Atlanta to Main Street Suwanee, where it remains today.

"Over the years, we've done several different things for the city; we've always had a good relationship. We don't do a lot of artistic, creative stuff; we just do it for the city because we think it's fun," said Burcher Gammage, whose grandfather founded the company.

Gammage heard about the historic signs project and was eager to help. A high-pressure waterjet was used to cut the steel, resulting in a beautiful piece of informative art.


