SUWANEE CELEBRATES 5 YEARS of Incorporation —



Suwanee has been a place where people have lived for hundreds of years. In fact, Suwanee Old Town was mentioned in a treaty between the United States government as far back as 1817. However, it wasn't until 1949 that Suwanee was officially incorporated as a city.

On February 25, 1949, the City of Suwanee - then very much an agricultural town - was incorporated. At the time, Suwanee was about 3.1 square miles and consisted of a few hundred residents. Today, Suwanee incorporates about 10.8 square miles and the city's population has blossomed to more than 21,900.

This year the city of Suwanee marks its 75th year of incorporation. But we can't celebrate where we are today without taking a moment to appreciate the journey.

The community can enjoy a commemoration of our 75th Anniversary milestone during the Suwanee Summer Porch Jam, and we can't wait to celebrate with you.

Suwanee Police Now Accepting Applications for Spring Program

The Suwanee Citizens Police Academy invites residents to gain insights into the daily operations of police officers at the spring Suwanee Citizens Police Academy. The seven-week program provides an opportunity for participants to delve into the world of law enforcement, encompassing both classroom instruction and practical experiences covering crime scene processing, traffic stops, building searches, crime prevention, and narcotics identification. The Spring 2024 classes will be held on Monday evenings from 6:30 – 9 pm, March 11 – April 29 (there will be no class on April 1 due to Gwinnett County Spring Break).

"The goal of the Citizens Police Academy is to foster an understanding of the challenges and responsibilities faced by our police officers, while also enabling open communication between citizens and the police department," said Suwanee Police Chief Cass Mooney.

The program is free and open to the public, but space is limited, with preference given to Suwanee residents or individuals working within the City of Suwanee. All applicants are required to undergo a criminal and driver history background check. # SMALL REDIVISION OF THE YEAR


Partnership Gwinnett and the Council for Quality Growth named StillFire Brewing and Station Park in Suwanee the Small Redevelopment Project of the Year at the annual Metro Atlanta Redevelopment Summit (MARS). The MARS Awards recognizes and honors pinnacle achievements in redevelopment across the 11-county metropolitan area.

Station Park is a City of Suwanee pocket park situated between the police station and StillFire Brewing at 373 Buford Highway. The city began renovations in the fall of 2020 that included artificial turf, new seating, additional lighting, and a refurbished playground. The restructuring also improved the alignment of the trail linking between Highway and Main Street, visually connecting the existing Town Center and the Town Center Park on Main expansion.

"The MARS program highlights innovative projects throughout the region that are transforming communities and driving economic prosperity," said Deven Cason, Vice President of Economic Development for Partnership Gwinnett. "Redevelopment often requires public-private partnerships which are proven to be catalyzing agents to long term growth and sustainability for every community; we are honored to bring focus to where this work is being done in metro Atlanta."





Town Center Park has put an indelible mark on the City of Suwanee. When the park opened in 2003, the city's population was a mere 11,000. Over the last 20 years, the number of residents who have picnicked in the park, played catch on the lawn, or attended a festival have grown too, and now exceeds 21,000. A testament to the growth of the city, Town Center Park is expanding too.

On September 26, 2022, the city broke ground on the expansion of Town Center on Main + DeLay Nature Park. The 25-acre site at the corner of Suwanee Dam Road and Main Street was acquired in 2002 as an early initiative within the community-driven comprehensive park and open space plan.

After more than a year of planning, designing, grading, cement-laying, bridge-building, and now the beginnings of landscape installation, Town Center on Main + DeLay Nature Park is beginning to take shape. Residents can observe the development of several noteworthy features including an impressive 1,200-foot-long park-spanning bridge connecting the library to the hilltop, two large water features, two expansive lawn areas, and the veteran's memorial,

Greater Good. In addition, the park is set to showcase sandpit volleyball courts and a community reading grotto adjacent to the library. The topography of the new park will allow it to overlook Town Center, further enhancing the relationship of the two spaces.

The development is anticipated to be fully completed by the summer of 2024. Upon completion, Town Center Park and Town Center on Main will seamlessly integrate into a unified space, linked by Station Park (located next to the police station) and the pedestrian tunnel under the railroad. The sister parks will transform the area, creating a cohesive "neighborhood" to encompass the Suwanee Library, PlayTown Suwanee, and Fire Station 13.

Just as Town Center Park has been instrumental to the life, growth and memories of this generation, this park addition is an investment in the future generations of Suwanee.

In upcoming issues, we will continue to provide park updates and feature interviews with individuals who have played integral roles in bringing this ambitious vision to life.

# PIERCE'S CORNER'S COLORFUL CREATION

The City of Suwanee is thrilled to share the story behind Suwanee's latest mural. "Futurist" was recently completed on Pierce's Corner, one of the oldest commercial buildings in Suwanee and located in our historic Old Town area.

Built in 1910, the building was most notably known as "the shop of many things." Pierce's Corner began as a 6,000-square-foot general store but later functioned as a silent movie theater, dentist office, antique store, and gas station and the second floor was once a Masonic Lodge. The city purchased the building in 2005 to renovate and preserve this piece of our history. The Suwanee Downtown Development Authority (DDA) shouldered the expense of the current renovation as its approach centers on strengthening the economic viability of downtown through economic development, aesthetic improvements, historic preservation, promotion and image-building efforts. The DDA has taken a forward-thinking approach to downtown development by strategically purchasing real estate in the downtown area to effectively catalyze development through targeted recruitment of unique shops and restaurants that fit the character of Suwanee.

Looking to bring large-scale, unique public art to the City's historic area and to enhance the beauty of the building, the City received a matching funds grant from the Gwinnett Creativity Fund. Painted on a wall that is 97 ft long and 30 ft high the mural, "Futurist," features bright colorful abstracts along with the familiar beauty of flowers. The focal point of the mural is an astronaut - but why? Astronauts symbolize hope, and in this mural, she is hopefully looking to the future. Georgia artist Shannon Lake was commissioned to paint the mural after careful selection following a request for qualification process. The Suwanee Public Arts Commission and the Suwanee Downtown Development Authority sponsored the project. "Futurist" is another impactful public art piece added to the extensive offerings in Suwanee.

# **NEW INTERCHANGE**

COMING TO I-85 AND MCGINNIS FERRY ROAD

The Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) is expanding to Suwanee residents daily commute options. GDOT began construction for a new interchange at I-85 at McGinnis Ferry Road in November 2023.

The project's primary purpose is to provide access to I-85. The project is a half-diamond interchange, meaning ramps will be installed on the south-facing side of the bridge only, resulting in access onto I-85 south and access from I-85 north onto McGinnis Ferry Road. The interchange will help alleviate traffic at the Lawrenceville-Suwanee exit for drivers commuting to and from Atlanta on I-85. Suwanee drivers wanting to travel north toward Buford would still need to use the Lawrenceville-Suwanee exit.

GDOT awarded the \$24.8 million contract to Norcrossbased CMES, Inc. The anticipated completion of the interchange is early 2026.

# RIDE GWINNETT ROUTE 50

Gwinnett County's transit system, Ride Gwinnett, launched a new local bus route serving the Suwanee area. Operating from 6 am to 10 pm Monday through Saturday, Route 50 runs on a 50-minute cycle beginning at Sugarloaf Mills, runs to Town Center, passes the Mall of Georgia, and ends at the Exchange at Coolray Field.

"Ride Gwinnett's focus right now is on enhancing mobility for all of Gwinnett by providing the right services in the right places," said Michael Rabalais, Ride Gwinnett Resources & Marketing Coordinator. "We've heard from residents how helpful bus service in the Mall of Georgia, Buford, and Suwanee areas would be and are excited at the reception Route 50 has received since its launch.

The route includes 32 stops in both directions, including stops on Lawrenceville-Suwanee Road, Satellite Boulevard, and Buford Highway in Suwanee. Stops are marked with a sign that has the Ride Gwinnett logo and route name. Additional routes are available from the Sugarloaf Mills Park & Ride.

The Route 50 fare is \$2.50; transfer to a different route is free. Fare payment may be made with cash, a Breeze Card, or through the Breeze Mobile 2 app. Riders can also download the myStop app for real-time bus tracking.

We look forward to continued growth in the future and helping to connect Gwinnettians to the places and people they care about most.

"We believe our Suwanee branch is popular because of its location. It is close to Town Center and PlayTown Suwanee. Families can spend a whole day in downtown Suwanee without driving," said Duffie Dixon, Gwinnett County Public Library Director of Marketing and Communications.

In the summer of 2024, Suwanee will upgrade the library's front yard with the addition of Town Center on Main and DeLay Nature Park! The park will transform the area, creating a cohesive public "neighborhood" encompassing the library, PlayTown Suwanee, and Fire Station 13.

As a longtime Suwanee resident, Dixon believes the new green space will make the branch a more prominent destination.

"That view from the library's front steps is going to be amazing, and having the start of the elevated walkway right there will surely bring in more visitors."

Main Street will shift around the park and exit onto Suwanee Dam Road at the traffic signal by the new fire station. This shift will allow for the closure of the median break on Suwanee Dam Road and Brogdon Road at the current intersection with Main Street, greatly improving the safety and traffic flow at that intersection.

Once completed, Town Center Park and Town Center on Main will function as a unified space, linked by Station Park (located next to the police station) and the pedestrian tunnel under the railroad. The topography of the new park will allow it to overlook Town Center, further enhancing the relationship of the two spaces.

Capture the passion of the community coming together. Love the Suwanee Fest parade or have a favorite local sports team? Show us your prideworthy local events.




