

MEET OUR COURSEL

Suwanee Farmers Market is held every Saturday from 8 am until noon in Town Center.

Here are a few of the tasty reasons to visit the market:



Steve Thomas and daughter Isabella Thomas harvest mushrooms just before going to markets for peak freshness. Their mushrooms are 100% organic! With no preservatives or chemicals used in the growth cycle, customers can taste the difference compared to store-bought alternatives. They rotate 14 different strains of mushrooms so customers get to try ones they normally wouldn't have the opportunity to buy.

This father daughter duo love every part of mushroom farming. They get to experience the full life cycle, starting with liquid mycelium. You can think of mycelium as the plant and the mushroom as the fruit. They provide a nutritious environment (whole oats, oak sawdust, etc.) for it to colonize. In some parts of the cycle, they let the plants listen to music (mushrooms like Pink Floyd). If they're happy, they produce fruit, the mushroom. But the fun doesn't stop there, Steve and Isabella then get to take their harvest to market and hear all the stories of how much their mushroom-loving customers enjoyed them.



Town Center on Main is rapidly nearing completion and it shows! Scheduled to open in late summer, anticipation is building. We spoke with Emmanuel Mezquita, Project Manager, and Nick Turner, Superintendent of Reeves Young, to provide an update and explain their involvement in the park project. Known for meticulous attention to detail, these two men brought their dedication and expertise to the project.

As the Project Manager, Mezquita handles the project's budgeting, hires all the subcontractors, orders all material to be delivered to the site, required documentation, and works alongside the city and project engineer to achieve a successful project. As the Project Superintendent, Turner oversees the day-to-day construction activities and schedules and organizes all subcontractors on the project grounds.

These two worked together as a team to create a strategic plan for completing the Town Center on Main project quickly and efficiently. They produced the project schedule, planned logistics, and ensured safety measures were in place for both on-site workers and the general public.

Throughout the project, there have been a variety of challenging aspects to the construction process, most notably the closing of the old Main Street and opening up the new Main Street to the public while simultaneously keeping the busiest library branch in Gwinnett County accessible to the public.

"There was a lot of planning and coordination between everyone to allow a smooth transition in opening up a new road for the public," commented Mezquita and Turner. "With little to no major complaint from anyone, we believe we accomplished this task excellently."

UNDERSTANDING THE STORMWATER UTILITY IN THE CITY OF SUWANEE

The City of Suwanee recently launched a significant initiative to address aging stormwater infrastructure. Developed primarily in the 1990s, Suwanee's stormwater systems now necessitate comprehensive measures to prevent costly failures and ensure community safety.

The Genesis of a Stormwater Utility

Suwanee city officials adopted the adage that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," which led to a proactive examination of the city's stormwater management needs and the eventual establishment of a dedicated stormwater utility in fiscal year 2023. The decision to establish a stormwater utility was the result of a comprehensive stormwater system assessment and a recommendation from a citizen's study committee.

How the Stormwater Utility Operates

The stormwater utility fee is on the property tax bills and calculated based on each property's impervious surface area, which contributes to runoff. This assessment method ensures equitable cost, reflecting each property's impact on the stormwater system. On average, homeowners pay about \$89, while townhouse owners pay approximately \$35. Properties with larger amounts of water-resistant surface area, including commercial properties, are assessed at a higher rate, reflecting their typically larger impervious surfaces.

Advanced Diagnostic Tools and Future Planning

Suwanee employs advanced diagnostic tools such as CCTV inspections to identify and prioritize necessary repairs, revealing around 300 projects. The city also performs visual inspections to comply with its MS4 permit, ensuring that 20% of stormwater pipes are inspected annually.

The Importance of the Stormwater Utility

Stormwater management is out of sight due to its underground nature, but it must not remain out of mind. Failed stormwater systems can lead to severe problems, such as sinkholes, which threaten property and public safety.

Establishing the stormwater utility is a testament to the city's commitment to sustainable and proactive infrastructure management. Suwanee aims to prevent failures that can lead to expensive repairs and disruptive emergencies.

Looking Ahead

The city plans to supplement its robust inspection and maintenance program by expanding its repair and upgrade projects. Future funding will ensure that stormwater infrastructure remains functional and safe for years to come. The stormwater utility represents a practical approach to planning and a critical investment in the city's resilience.
